Bio

Jordan Acker Anderson received her MFA in 2007 from the University of lowa and BFA in 2002 from the University of Nebraska at Omaha. She is a director and professor of art for Mount Mary University in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. She has an established exhibit record, and has been published in numerous Studio Visit magazines and the Mid America Print Journal. Her works are included in the Field Museum and University of Iowa public collections.

Statement

In my practice, I respond to our interconnectedness through the act of painting. My compositions are a call and response between states of disruption and integration. I layer and detach from previous studio sessions to create a mindful aesthetic that reflects our impermanence. My imagery develops through intuitive actions and interpretations of observations drawn from daily life. I use compositions as a way to mark time and create symbolic calendars. I structure compositions on bilateral order and relieved symmetry as these connect to embodiment and nature. My works become visual prayers that hold my concern. The process is a meditation in its act, and the result is an accumulation of mark, memory, and symbolism.

Statement

My fascination with the natural world is nurtured by lots of looking, while outside and in, as I travel through neighborhoods, cities, parks, greenways and waterways. Organic patterns—branches, leaves, stems, blooms waves, bubbles, ripples clouds and grasses shaped by wind —these are the vocabulary and color palette for making my art. My artwork is evocative of atmosphere, land, and water—connection and movement—without necessarily using representational imagery. Shapes and lines are informed by their neighboring shapes and lines, illustrating interconnection and evolution: what has come before inevitably shapes that which comes afterward.

Statement

I am inspired by the unique and versatile medium of encaustic which allows me to work with it in multiple layers, similar to how I use depth of field in my photography. This technique is hands-on and created by laying down layers and layers of hot wax.

My work often incorporates vintage found materials from local antique stores. The mix of old and new has always been something I have been drawn to. There is something extraordinary about vintage textures, patterns, and design.

Nimrod is a lecturer for Net-Art && Cultures at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, where they got their MFA under the New Artist Society fellowship.

Statement

I work through a post-conceptual approach to sculpture, installation, and media art. My works are vehicles by which the energy of exploratory research in history and philosophy drives concrete circumstances, materials, and available technology. Exhibiting this work is a model on a 1:1 scale of a way of thinking, knowing, or being. This manifests through activating the exhibition space in a way that is never constricted to a human sense. I refer to my studio work as action-thinking, a merging of research and praxis into a simultaneous lesson and application. The works created through this process are emblematic of acting while being beside knowledge rather than immersed in it, enjoying the artistic privilege of doing without knowing. Working with or about media technology, my work is an act of revealing: creating devices and techniques for deepening relationships with unseen hierarchies and structures. Whether these are facts from the history of science, retelling of origin stories, or electromagnetic energies, there is always a quasimaterial way in which my work is entangled with something missing from its sensory appearance.

Lisa Baratta Brookfield, WI

Bio

I came to art late in life when I signed up for an art workshop at PSA in 2015 following an early retirement. After five decades of considering myself the least artistic person I knew, it came as quite a shock to discover that one could learn to make art. Now my joy in exploring the artistic process has become a passionate hobby. My art education has been a combination of being self-taught and taking workshops, many in Door Co. as well as online.

Statement

What started as in interest in drawing has evolved into working in watercolor, primarily because of a desire to incorporate color and capture beauty in my work. I then was drawn to the somewhat unpredictable nature of watercolor even as I grapple with that. Landscapes and architecture are my most common subjects. I enjoy depicting architecture for the balance of precision and expressiveness. My artwork is the result of a push-pull of balancing realism and impressionistic interpretation.

These works are part of a series depicting Door Co. barns I started this year. I think the suburban girl in me was drawn to them as subjects because there can be an air of romanticism over these iconic barns. Perhaps people imagine a "quieter, more simple life" that belies the very hard work behind farming. Made more timely by the decline in the number of family farms, these barns symbolize a disappearing rural lifestyle.

April Behnke Chicago, IL

Bio

Chicago-based painter April Behnke received her MFA from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2011 and has completed residencies at the Bemis Center for Contemporary Arts in Omaha and the Slak Foundation in the Netherlands. She has exhibited nationally and internationally, including in Mexico City, Seoul, New York City, Berlin, Chicago, London, and Basel.

Statement

My work is composed of paintings and drawings that explore themes of order, disorder, and visual play through abstract patterns.

To form a new piece, I create a grid or multiple grids constructed from basic geometric shapes. On the grids, I implement a set of rules - some are strict, while others are open to interpretation and intuition. Some are limited to certain areas, while others extend across each piece.

Making the work is a process of discovery, as I never quite know what to expect from the union of planned and improvised elements. Working this way requires intense focus and looking at the pieces invites a similar experience. The viewer finds in them something playful, accessible, consuming, and even puzzling. Their eyes travel and continue to discover as they look, never quite fully grasping the image before them.

This summer I have been experimenting with alcohol ink painting.

Statement

My paintings are created using alcohol inks. I then use markers to add some details and define some shapes. I used nature themes from my garden in my work and have experimented with layering colors to create dimension.

Bio

I am a ceramic arts hobbyist. I enjoy playing with clay on the wheel and hand building. Texture and form, taking the wet clay through all the steps is my focus. It is a challenge and a pleasure.

Statement

I have tried different media over the years. As a child I loved to draw. As an adult, playing with threads in weaving and guilting were interests, but nothing compares to playing with clay. My first try was in college, taking a class with potter Bruce Grimes. It was challenging, sometimes frustrating, learning to center a piece of wet clay on the wheel, but once successful, it was hard to stop. I liked it and enjoyed a few semesters of classes. After college my life was busy with family and work, but then I had a chance to try clay again. A friend mentioned that Community Clay, an evening gathering of clay enthusiasts with a leader to answer questions was starting up at PAS. I went out on a limb and tried it. Having to relearn many things after a 30-year hiatus was a challenge, but a wonderful experience. I've been fortunate to learn more from local potters. Renee Schwaller, Chad Luberger, Roger Bergan and Jeanne Aurelius to name a few. I enjoy the process, the many stages from kneading the wet clay, to forming it by throwing on the wheel or by hand, adding textures, or handles, choosing glazes and sing the results after a firing. Making many decisions throughout the process is a challenge and a pleasure that playing with clay has given me.

Beki Borman was born and raised in the Milwaukee area of Wisconsin. She attended the Milwaukee Institute of Art & Design where she received her BFA in painting in 2004. Since graduating, Beki has exhibited her work both locally and nationally. For Beki's studio work she paints colorful and textural abstract landscapes in oil and acrylics using a combination of painting knife and brush techniques. Some of her influences include Vincent Van Gogh, Wolf Kahn, and Wayne Thiebaud. Beki works out of her studio in Waukesha, WI.

Statement

For me the landscape is the most accessible subject of the natural world. It has shaped our understanding of visual order. When I look at a landscape my mind instantly begins to evaluate its design. I lay out the big shapes, patterns of color, and areas of contrast. My interest is not in recreating the scene, but rather in learning from its aesthetic. I use a painting knife as my primary tool to create a textured surface that describes the vast color experience of a landscape from afar but up close supports the objective nature of paint. Through layering I seek out a nuanced variety in mark making which speaks to the subtle experiences of space and light.

Brian Bosworth Brooklyn, NY

Bio

I am retired from a 50-year career in regional economic development, working internationally in the Foreign Service of U.S. Agency for International Development as well as throughout the U.S, running state economic development programs in the Midwest and consulting with many other regions. Although my wife and I have for may years spent much of our summers in Door County Wisconsin, our permanent residence in Brooklyn, NY.

Statement

I paint mostly in an abstract style, usually incorporating a wide mix of media that includes acrylics, hot wax (encaustics), cold wax, oil, alcohol inks, and such textural substances such as sand or plaster. Since the buildup of these materials can be heavy, I usually paint on cradled wood panels or on microfiber cloth or similar materials which can be adhered to wood panels. I usually apply these materials with bowl scrapers or knives or with my hands. I am primarily concerned with colors, shapes, and textures.

Now, I am immersed in the practice of art - painting, sketching, planning new work, visiting galleries, taking classes to hone skills, and exploring new techniques, subject matter and media. What a joy to have discovered this new way of looking at the world!

Statement

I am hard at work learning to paint. Since retirement in 2019, I have painted well over 350 paintings, taking to heart the adage that practice makes perfect—or at least leads to betterment. I explore a range of subject matter—landscapes, still life, people. While I spend as much time planning as I do putting paint on a surface, when I paint I fight my leanings toward precision (a remnant from years of practicing law) and strive to paint broadly, freely and expressively.

I love to create in different media. I started painting in watercolor, then moved to acrylics. Within the past 18 months I have bravely waded into oil painting, oil and cold wax, and, most recently, encaustics. I enjoy the freedom of moving from one material to another - cross-pollinating each with lessons learned from successes, and failures, missteps and happy accidents working with a different material.

No matter what the media or subject matter, I am continually drawn to the challenge of presenting, in two dimensions, the interplay between light and color. And to use that interplay as a means of conveying emotion. I employ color boldly, but deliberately, using my palette to convey varying degrees of warmth and coldness, brightness and darkness, I hope that my work, in turn, evokes an emotion or sparks the memory of a feeling.

Bio

I received a Certificate in Photography Technology from the College of DuPage in Glen Ellyn, Illinois in 2014. I primarily work in analog and alternative process photography and have been creating orotones for the last several years. I am a founding member of the Fleeting Moments Artists collaborative and am represented by Woodwalk Gallery in Egg Harbor, Wisconsin.

Statement

Orotones (sometimes called gold-tones or Curt-Tones) are a photographic process made popular in the late 1800's by Edward Curtis. Silver gelatin positive images on clear glass are backed with a gold substance to give the image a glistening, almost 3D quality. I use liquid emulsion to hand coat watercolor paper and expose each print in the darkroom, like an ordinary silver gelatin print. After the development process, I do an emulsion transfer, similar to a Polaroid emulsion lift, onto clear glass. After it has dried, the emulsion side of the glass is coated with gilder's wax. Because of the finicky nature the process, no two prints are ever the same and no one is ever perfect. The images I am submitting for this show are photograms of flowers, printed as orotones.

Bio

Raised and currently residing in the Chicagoland area, Maggie Capettini holds a BA in Studio Art and a Master of Arts in Teaching. Her works are held in museum/gallery collections in Batavia, Warrenville, and West Chicago, Illinois, as well as private collections in the United States and internationally. A giant fiberglass duck she painted with a Tuscan landscape makes its home in the media center at Lockport Township High School East Campus in Lockport, Illinois.

Statement

I am primarily an oil painter who loves to paint with knives and to paint outdoors. In recent years, I have begun to explore other mediums, tools, and processes in my painting, including working more abstractly and taking on challenges to grow as an artist. This January, I participated in a daily painting challenge to create a painting from life each day of the month. I deepened the challenge by setting myself a limit of 40 brush strokes for each painting: lay the brush down, move it around (as much as I wanted/needed to) and lift it up – that is "one stroke". For the most part, I stuck to this count for each painting I did for the challenge. Sometimes, additional strokes were needed to bring a painting to a finished state. This way of painting requires a lot of looking and thinking between each stroke, as well as a good amount of color-mixing strategizing. Though the process is slow, the paintings maintain a fresh and spontaneous feeling.

Ginnie Cappaert Egg Harbor, WI

Bio

Ginnie Cappaert is a full-time visual artist with a studio/gallery in Egg Harbor, Wi. Her surroundings of nature and travels inspire and influence the oil, mixed media paintings that she has become known for. She feels compelled to interpret the landscape in an abstracted, intuitive and playful manner. When not painting or running her gallery she enjoys hiking, horse back riding, yoga and traveling. She spends extended time in Santa Fe, New Mexico in the winter where she is also represented by a gallery. Locally she is represented at Edgewood Orchard Galleries and Cappaert Contemporary.

Statement

It is the landscape imagery and its deep space that I explore in my work by building up 30-40 layers of oil paints and mixed mediums. I apply very thin layers of oil paint to the wood board adding texture, scraping the paint, dissolving areas and then rebuilding them as I construct the painting. The removing process is as important as the layering. This 'surface tension' eventually is transformed into a peaceful, subtle mx of texture and natural colors. I strive to accomplish a feeling of serenity not only as I paint, but for the viewer as well. Always continuing to find that balance between landscape and abstraction.

Skies, vast lands, colors and light also inspire me and I am thankful for the beauty around me and the ability to transform it into my art.

Statement

My collage practice incorporates aspects of printmaking, drawing, painting, and digital media. I generate my own collage material by first making monotype prints or paintings which are destroyed later in the creative process after being ripped or cut apart. These initial compositions are inspired by intuitive mark making, experimentation, and play. Prints, drawings, and paintings are repurposed as raw material and treated like building blocks for larger collages as they are torn and cut apart into new puzzle-like pieces. Once I have substance to work with, I arrange pieces of collage papers by continuously moving and organizing elements until a composition feels complete. I try multiple combinations and reposition materials to discover relationships between layers, shapes, textures, lines and negative and positive space. I sometimes include found imagery from magazines, books, or old photographs to create variety in my mark and image making. I embrace the immediacy of collage processes and value that they can produce results guickly. My subject matter is often influenced by simple shapes, patterns, marks, and text. Similar to Surrealism and Dadaism, I am interested in exploring the unconscious by creating intuitively and without limitations or expectations.

I use acrylic mediums to build up texture, then I create more texture by painting layer upon layer of paint, and scraping and scratching into the wet paint.

There's nothing serious about my abstract style. It's spontaneous and unplanned, and it lets me be mindlessly creative. Oh, and I often remind myself... "If you don't like something, just paint over it!"

My prints experiment with overlapping organic and linear layers that inform one another and explore the dynamic beauty of relationship. I enjoy playing with texture, shape and pattern by adding and lifting materials from one inked plate as I press on. Working with leaves, grasses, flowers, and vines from our meadow and woods has been a meditative way to pass many days during this complicated time, an unexpected gift. Abstracting my surrounding landscape is a primary focus. I am inspired by sense of place and the endless possibilities of pulling prints and eco printing with meadow and dye plants, woodland finds, and whatever turns up. When creating these monotypes I enjoyed printing with shapes cut from 45 records and was inspired by Edouard Manet's chrysanthemum paintings.

As destiny is determined by multiple unseen forces, the lives of clouds are guided by the wind and all the vast, invisible phenomena of climate and weather.

Liu's oil paintings depict the dynamics, textures, and spaces of clouds through different movements, media, and sizes. The manner and existence of abstract cloud formations are determined by the combination of surrounding atmospheric elements. Clouds do not have fixed shapes or colors; their mutability reflects the different meanings assigned to them by people with different individual histories and cultures. Having grown up with a Chinese cultural background, Liu views clouds as the best explanation for destiny, representing a spiritual aura within the universe and nature.

As an Iranian woman whose life has been heavily touched by the political events of the halfcentury in Iran, I have focused on modern Iranian women's issues. The Iranian revolution in 1978 had an impact on Iranian women's daily lives dramatically as well as reshaped their identities and their role in society. The core of my concern is the injustices that impose themselves on Iranian life, the hardships, and the torments that innocent people are suffering. Art can be an impactful way to expose the lack of power that women have in their lives, but it can also be dangerous to the maker. They are not produced in Iran; we have no comic heroes or Painting comical figures lets me imagine the fun of these men and offers my wish for Contemporary Iran to become a peaceful, safe place where people can thrive.

Statement

Karen Sako's paintings fuse traditional art principles with exploratory techniques and materials. Working from direct observation and through abstraction she uses soulful marks combined with energetic colors to create an immersive connection to light and form that directs her imagination into existence.

I create plein air sketches on location in my sketchbook with casein paint. Back in the studio, I will crop my sketch determining the best composition and begin to experiment with color. Using the color studies as a reference, I create complex transparent layers with oil, cold wax and other mediums to begin to achieve depth in my work. This allows elements to push and pull the viewer blurring the lines between representation and abstraction. I keep applying layers until I am satisfied but many times I find myself obliterating layers through scratching or dissolving to show the remnants and history of those previous layers. My final layer may be a glaze or thick brushwork to be sure that the painting tell the story I intended.

My inspiration comes from emotional responses to my own life situations, adventures, observing nature, being around other creatives, powerful music and a symbolic allegory.

I rely on my strong art background and understanding of design, color, and composition as I make decisions about my next step, responding to what occurs on the canvas with each layer. Color and texture are common elements in my work, across all mediums. Whether working in paint or collage, I am laying down pieces of color and building texture to create rich layers and detailed surfaces.

From representational to abstract, I strive to create dynamic space that is intricate, but also grounded. But I do not want to overwhelm. I still want the painting to offer a resting place. For me, it is important to find moments of stillness within a world of complexity and activity.
